Hudson River Housing Homeless Shelter:

At this time things are up in the air with regards to the Homeless Shelter. The latest so far is the Shelter Pods will be removed in September which would mean our obligation for Shelter Meal Volunteering will end in August. The County is still planning on using

the Dutchess County Jail building as the new over night shelter. They are planning on housing 100 homeless guests leaving up to 50+ homeless people without shelter. Arra Mowry and Joan Heller are on a task force with Hudson River Housing to find satellite locations for those not able to go to the County Run Shelter. HRH is looking for small, 10-15 bed locations in Southern Dutchess as well as Northern Dutchess to house these folks over night only. They would be brought in at 7pm and will leave at 7am.

The locations they are able to find will be responsible to feed them a light supper and a light breakfast. HRH will bring in the cots and bedding at these locations and will also clean up after the guests leave.

Liberty Station Food Collection:

Deliveries to Liberty Station for our homeless Vets have been limited to once every couple of months due to the amount of donations coming in. We have been checking all the bins (one outside patio near Keith's office, one inside near Keith's office and one in the Gathering Area) weekly. We ask when you do your grocery shopping if you can pick up a bag, can, jar or box to put in any of the bins, that would be wonderful. If you wish to donate financially towards Stop and Shop Gift Cards for the Veterans to purchase food, send in a check made out to NHRC and Memo "Liberty Station". Outreach will purchase the gift cards and deliver them to the Director at Liberty Station for distribution to the veteran families to purchase groceries for the family.

<u>Clothing Donation Bin</u>: The shed is here and the first batch was picked up which was about 80 bags. As of June 23, there were over 95 bags dropped off. The way St. Paulys determines the

pay to NHRC is based on the number of bags. They estimate each bag to weight 11.5 pounds. Arra and Joan have been cleaning out the shed by stacking the bags neatly and clearing them out from in front of the drop off shoot.

The following is a list of items that they accept:

Clothing of all kinds(adults, children and infants); shoes; belts; purses; blankets; sheets; pillowcases; curtains as well as stuffed animals.

Pete's Place:

This is a program run by Hudson River Housing for all young people to stop in to get help. They give referrals for housing and food, help with job search, free internet access, counseling and help with bullying with trained care managers on site. They are always in need of snack foods, personal sized hygiene products for the kids to get cleaned up and enjoy a snack or two. There is a black bin the Gathering Area for any donations.

Prayer Shawls:

Many shawls have been distributed and we have plenty more to send out. Please, if you know of someone within the church or your family or close friends that could use a little comfort, please let Arra Mowry know.

We absolutely want to thank Amy Burger for her continued work on crocheting these beautiful shawls.

<u>Baby Blankets and Hats:</u> We have a number of these Blankets and Hats that were beautifully crocheted by Amy Burger, Diane Sanford and Liz Miedowski. So far, Vassar Brothers Medical Center NICU does not need any at this time. Outreach will continue to look at other hospitals that could use them.

Veterans Appreciation Board:

Outreach Council has discussed having a bulletin board recognizing our church heroes. The board would consist of IN MEMORY, IN HONOR, CURRENT ACTIVE

Veterans. Every member of NHRC can have a name of a family member (no matter how far back in their ancestry) added to the board. We would need the name, rank, and branch of service. Listing the war they served in would also be great.

Not sure where this board would hang but originally thought in Fellowship Hall like most churches do but because we rarely have Coffee Hour there, perhaps the Side Narthex, Rear Narthex or the Gathering Area. We will see what Consistory likes. More information on this will be forthcoming very soon. Give it some thought and get the names and info of the American Heroes in your family ready.
